Dear Friends of Christ, one of the most important practices found in the Judaic faith involved the sacrificial rituals that God required His people to offer Him. The sacrifice consisted of a priest publicly offering or transferring to God a visible gift or victim, which signified

God's supreme and fatherly dominion over them. The sacrifices originally took place within the precincts of the Tabernacle. Eventually they occurred within the great Temple that King Solomon completed around 970 B.C. An animal was required to be slain as a sin and peace offering. This was done because the ancients believed that blood was the seat of life; consequently, the offering of blood became equated with an offering of the life of the animal, and the life of the animal eventually became a symbol for the soul.

The Jewish people greatly esteemed three kinds of sacrifices: 1) The Sacrifice of the Covenant - the covenant which Moses established between God and His people by sprinkling the blood of the slain animal on both the altar and the people with the words, "Behold the blood of the covenant which the Lord has made with you" (cf. Exodus 24); 2) The **Pasch** (literally, "a passing by"), or **Passover** – the most solemn of Jewish festivals which commemorated Israel's deliverance from the bondage of Egypt and the preservations of the first-born of the Hebrews (cf. Exodus 12); 3) The Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur) - a day instituted for the expiation of all the sins and irreverence committed by the people during the course of the preceding year.

What is the relationship of these ancient Jewish rituals with regards to our Faith? As Catholics, we believe that Christ fulfilled these ancient Jewish rituals in His own Person. Jesus established a new covenant between God and His Church when He said to His apostles at the Last Supper, "This cup....is the new covenant in my Blood (Lk 22:20; 1 Cor 11:25). Jesus is the new Pasch, "The Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world" (Jn 1:29). We can say that the punishment and wrath of God passes over us when we are bathed in the Blood of Christ. Finally, St. Paul speaks of Jesus Christ as being made "a sacrifice of propitiation" (Rom 3:25), with the Death of Christ whose precious blood and sacrifice are efficacious once and for all (cf. Letters to the Hebrews). Unlike the Day of Atonement that removes only the sins of the past year, Jesus' sacrifice is eternal. In His sacrifice of Calvary, Jesus fulfills all these Old Testament sacrifices and obtains for us all the graces necessary for our salvation. It is this sacrifice that is re-presented every time we partake in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. Pax Christi, Fr. Thomas

THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



"Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men." With these words. Jesus invites Simon (Peter) and his brother Andrew to follow Him and be His disciples. We often speak of the subtleties of translation. In the original Greek in which St. Mark wrote his Gospel, a better

translation would be, "Come after me, and I will make you become fishers of men." It is the beginning of a process.

We are called to that same process. It is not as if it happens quite suddenly. It happens over time, and it is a progression. If we are to be "fishers of men," we are to be evangelizers and disciples of the Lord, and we are to represent what it means to be part of the Kingdom of God.

Of course, Simon and Andrew "abandoned their nets and followed him." It may be more difficult for us to "abandon our nets" so to speak, but it does prompt us that we need to make major changes in our lives if we are going to follow Jesus. Simon and Andrew, and then James and John, were common men, normal people. They had no theological credentials nor did they have any special status in the world.

Most of us are similar. Jesus did not select them (or us) for who they were. He called them for what He could do through them. It is the same with each of us. Yes, we are called, but in order to really fulfill our calling we need to follow and trust in Jesus.

È brevissima, ma offre una sintesi felicissima dei temi fondamentali di tutta la sua predicazione: il compimento del tempo, il regno di Dio, la conversione, la fede al vangelo. Poi vi è la chiamata dei primi discepoli: è il paradigma concreto di ogni seguela.

Ci sono due indicativi teologici che sono la ragione dei due successivi imperativi antropologici: è suonata l'ora messianica, l'attesa è finita poiché il regno di Dio si è fatto vicino, è ormai presente nella storia, perciò non è più possibile rimandare la decisione, occorre convertirsi, cambiare cioè la testa e la direzione del cammino passando a credere al vangelo.

Conversione e fede non sono due azioni che si succedono, ma due momenti del medesimo movimento: quello negativo del distacco, quello positivo di fondare la vita sul vangelo, cioè credere, mettendosi a seguire Gesù, appunto come Simone e Andrea, Giacomo e Giovanni.

Vangelo è il termine greco che significa lieta notizia nuova, e una bella notizia evidentemente porta gioia. Il regno di Dio è l'espressione riassuntiva di tutta la gioia. Gesù è questo regno arrivato: la gioia è qui a portata di mano. Chi decide di seguire Gesù è sicuro di arrivarci anche lui.




World Day for Consecrated Life
